Autonomy and responsibility	Ability to make decisions independently and take ownership of actions.	<i>A student manages their homework without reminders.</i>	<i>Teachers constantly intervene, and the student avoids accountability.</i>
Abundance	Perception of prosperity expressed through an attitude of generosity and appreciation, emphasizing possibilities.	<i>Students share ideas and materials, seeing learning as something to be multiplied, not divided.</i>	<i>Students keep materials to themselves and view knowledge as a competition.</i>
Faith OR trust	Belief in others and in oneself; trusting relationships and a sense of security.	<i>Students feel safe to ask questions, trusting that teachers will listen with respect.</i>	<i>Students stay silent out of fear that teachers will dismiss or ridicule their questions.</i>
Freedom	The right and ability to express oneself and make choices within respectful boundaries.	<i>Students expressing new ideas or propose different topics for projects.</i>	<i>Every task is imposed without discussion or student input.</i>
Holistic development	Growth that includes emotional, physical, cognitive, social, and spiritual well-being.	<i>School supports art, physical education, emotional literacy.</i>	<i>Only academic results are valued and tested.</i>
Human dignity	Recognition of the inherent value and rights of every person.	<i>Teachers treat all students with respect, regardless of ability.</i>	<i>Public shaming is used as a disciplinary strategy.</i>
Inclusion and diversity	Embracing and valuing differences in ability, background, or identity.	<i>Students of different backgrounds work together on projects, each contribution being valued.</i>	<i>Some students are excluded from group work because of their background or abilities.</i>
Innovative spirit and creativity	Curiosity, problem-solving, and openness to new ideas.	<i>Students create their own projects or solutions.</i>	<i>Rigid curriculum discourages exploration.</i>
Joy of life	A positive attitude, gratitude, and the ability to enjoy the moment.	<i>Learning is viewed as journey of effort and perseverance, enjoying their growth along the way.</i>	<i>School days are filled with stress and pressure.</i>
Love	Unconditional care and affection for others.	<i>Teachers show patience, listen, and care for student needs, beyond academics.</i>	<i>Cold, transactional interactions dominate.</i>
Peace and non violence	Commitment to harmony, cooperation, and resolving conflicts without aggression.	<i>Conflicts are resolved through mediation and listening.</i>	<i>Punishments escalate tension without addressing root causes.</i>
Respect	Accepting others' rights, differences, and boundaries.	<i>Students take turns speaking and listen actively.</i>	<i>Teachers dismiss students' questions as unimportant or irrelevant.</i>
Rule of law	Following shared rules that promote fairness and safety.	<i>Class rules are co-created and fairly enforced.</i>	<i>Some students are favored while others are unfairly punished.</i>
Shared education responsibility	Family and school work together to support the child's learning and growth.	<i>Teachers value and include parents in learning processes.</i>	<i>Schools exclude families or ignore their input.</i>
Simplicity and empathy	Living authentically and understanding others' emotions with compassion.	<i>Teachers listen to a child's worry and responds with kindness, without complicating or dismissing the issue.</i>	<i>The teacher complicates the issue with blame or criticism instead of comfort.</i>
